2017 INITIATIVES AND GOALS

Members of the Executive Committee held an annual leadership retreat in January 2017 to map out the coming year's goals, challenges and initiatives. Key organizational topics such as projects, fundraising, membership engagement, and student mentorship were extensively discussed

Some key results from the leadership retreat included:

- Streamline fundraising efforts through coordinated and targeted company outreach, identifying project specific grants and building a corporate sponsorship package
- Building relationships with local engineering companies with lunch and learn presentations, engaging past company donors and project team members championing EWB's mission at their companies
- Recruit, engage and retain members with member networking events, connecting interested members with projects and revamping the Chapter's website and social media engagement
- Provide volunteering opportunities for members by hosting community service and work day events in collaboration with local engineering and community groups

KICKBALL WITHOUT BORDERS

The Puget Sound Professional Chapter hosted its first annual kickball tournament Kickball Without Borders in September. The event took place at Woodland Park where over 10 teams from local engineering companies participated in this event and competed for the prized trophy. The planning committee set up a beer garden and refreshment stands and served a crowd of over 120 participants. Our Chapter raises about \$5000 drew in five sponsors.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS IN 2017

SIERRA LEONE - HEALTH CARE CLINIC

The most recent program our Chapter adopted in March 2016 is in southern Sierra Leone with the Wai Community. The community is located in a region where scarce health services poor sanitation is causing high infant and postpartum mortality. The community is looking for resources to access comprehensive health care.

EWB-PSP is looking to construct a health care facility and build partnerships with local organizations to arrange supplies, equipment and personnel for the facility. The project team went on its first assessment trip to the community in May 2017, to establish contact with the community, assess the feasibility of constructing a clinic and evaluate existing resources. The team had a successful trip where they met with key members of the community, conducted surveys, and toured the proposed project site.

The team is also working on bringing basic utilities to the clinic such as water, sanitation and energy to run the clinic. The project team is planning on going on another assessment trip in Spring of 2018 to evaluate the development of wells or rain catchment system for the proposed health clinic.

UGANDA – INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY CENTER

Our Uganda team is working in Coope, a small community located in northern Uganda requested assistance in the construction of an information technology center to empower their members with greater economic opportunities. Our Chapter had adopted this program in December 2013 and had conducted two assessment trips in the springs of 2015 and 2016.

EWB-PSP is working with Coope to bring water, electricity and sanitation to the community center. In addition to BOSCO Uganda a local NGO; the EWB team has partnered with and Architects Without Borders (AWB) for the design of community center. The team also sought to partner with a Seattle based NGO, Kilowatts for Humanity for the design and installation of solar panels to power the community center.

In 2017, the team conducted alternatives evaluations and prepared several design documents to address three aspects of the program from structural design of a community center, powering the community center with solar panels, identifying a reliable source of water supply and evaluating different approaches to building sanitary systems. They also worked with BOSCO Uganda to acquire certified surveying and title of the project area. They are currently working on compiling construction cost estimates.

NICARAGUA – WATER SUPPLY

The Nicaragua program is one of the Chapter's long standing partnerships with communities in northern Nicaragua, founded by a Seattle based NGO Agros International. The Chapter had established a new project in La Bendiction Community in January 2016. This is a community is located in rural Nicaragua and the new home for over 50 families who moved there in search of financial independence. The community faces adversity from inadequate water supply and health problems due to source contamination.

EWB team conducted its first assessment trip to the community in December 2016 and established a relationship with the Community with the help of Agros International. They spoke with community members regarding their water needs, evaluated the existing water systems and collected hydraulic information.

The project team is currently designing a new water distribution system to help the community secure a sustainable supply of water and build a distribution center with individual household spigots. In 2017, the team evaluated several new sources of water for feasibility and water volume and also looked into rehabilitating existing systems. The proposed water distribution system will be designed alongside new water treatment system and storage tank.

The team is planning to construct the water supply system in Spring 2018 and is preparing construction and design documents.

NICARAGUA – COFFEE PROCESSING AND WASTEWATER TREATMENT

In October 2012, the Chapter established this project in the community of Tierra Nueva to design and construct a coffee processing facility with a wastewater treatment system to filter and treat a season's worth of coffee processing wastewater.

The project teams conducted two assessment trips in January 2013 and February 2014 where they established a relationship with the community, conducted topographical surveying, spoke with local municipality engineers, scouted locally available construction materials and toured local coffee processing facilities.

The coffee processing plant and wastewater treatment facility were constructed in Spring 2015. Since then the team had conducted two monitoring trips in December 2016 and December 2017. The purpose of the monitoring trips were to witness the beneficio in operation, identify any operational improvements and evaluate the project's impact within the community.

An EWB traveled to the Tierra Nueva community in December 2017, to observe the coffee harvest being processed and evaluate the treatment system at work. They are working with Agros and the community to improve operations.
